Recognition was also given to Anne Flinn, of Halifax, for introducing Jack to Bonny Lea Farm all those years ago. The way she tells it, Jack committed to organizing the tournament for one year. But, then fell in love with Bonny Lea Farm and continued to do it until this year.

When asked why he has been so committed to Bonny Lea Farm, Jack had this to say,
