

Realizing Goals

Our person-centred approach means that we are here to support participants in identifying and realizing their goals at home, at work, and in the community; and building their social, physical, emotional and spiritual well-being.

WHAT GOOD CAN COME FROM THE FLU?

Few people blossom with a gastro-bug or the flu. For Hansi, it was just the impetus needed to jump start his janitorial assistant job at Bonny Lea Farm. He had expressed an interest in such a position and learning the skills required. Now, every Thursday he carefully disinfects all door knobs and high traffic surfaces, helping to keep us all germ-free.

REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE

We strive to minimize our waste with the help of Blair and Debbie. Their jobs include gathering and sorting our recycling at work and residence respectively.

DREAMS FROM THE SPOOKY TO SPIRITUAL

Imagine walking into the Board Room and screaming in fear. That's exactly what happened last fall, when Tom's dream of making a haunted house came true. Tom and his friend Josh worked with staff to create spooky decorations and 'scare' participants who visited the space.

Floyd knows he needs spiritual nourishment. Attending church with his family and enjoying gospel music are among his goals. This past year we helped him realize these goals by driving him to visit with his family and assisting him to attend a Nova Scotia Mass Choir Concert.

Acting for Empowerment

EVERYONE HAS DREAMS

Bonny Lea Farm's person-centred model, means that we shape our supports and programs around the needs and wants of the participants who live and work here.

We strive to remind others that everyone has dreams and a place in the community.

Many participants identified drama as a goal in their annual Individual Program Plan.

To fulfill this dream for participants, we applied for and received a Building Vibrant Communities grant from the Department of Communities, Culture and Heritage and partnered with the Chester Playhouse Theatre.

The results exceeded our expectations and had an immeasurable impact on participants, staff and the community.

Local playwright Cynthia Myers shaped the play, "Something's in the Air", by working with participants to develop their own characters, costumes, bios, and props. When asked what their dreams were, many participants felt empowered to act out their "dream jobs" on stage, including an RCMP officer, radio host, rapper, basketball player, chauffer, and cowgirl.

Acting for Empowerment, had **10 GOALS** including:

- ♥ Showcase the many abilities of people living with disabilities
- ♥ Ask employers to consider using our skills in their organizations
- ♥Create five new work placement partnerships
- ♥ Build on employable skills & develop new skills
- ♥ Empower participants to share their dreams with others
- ♥ Public to realize people living with a disability have dreams, goals & relationships.



DID YOU KNOW?

The idea of a play came from the participants' interest in drama.

The play was written by local playwright, Cynthia Myers, based on interviews with each of the actors.

Each actor helped design their costume.

Our workshop crew made props and set pieces for the show.

For many participants, this was their first time on stage.



Learning & Growth

Before getting on stage, participants:

- Memorized lines, demonstrating their ability to accurately learn and remember detailed information
- ◆ Built props, designed costumes, folded programs and baked cookies, showing their ability to create, build and perform hands on tasks
- Prepared bios, highlighting their likes and skills...

We all learned that participants are capable of so much more than they are often challenged with and are willing to enhance their skills exponentially. This project highlighted the importance of being able to take risk, be challenged, fail and learn from mistakes.

This provided him with an introduction to the work of each of our social enterprises, and a quieter setting to help make the transition to work a successful one! He now works in the workshop for part of the day and was an actor in our recent play, Something's in the Air.


We know there is a bright future for Dan here at Bonny Lea Farm and we are thrilled to be able to offer him and others this opportunity now and in the future. Thanks to you.

Financial Overview

Ensuring quality of life, making dreams come true and delivering our unique programs is possible because of your support - from program staff salaries to electricity and insurance.

Our residential program and a portion of our day program are funded by the Department of Community Services. The balance of day program expenses are paid through donations, events, sponsorships and grants - most significantly our capital and operating grant from the Pew Charitable Trust.

Our 2018-2019 revenues were just over \$4.5 million, while our expenditures were just over \$4.4 million. We finished the year with a \$105,000 surplus.*





Turning Abilities Into Opportunities

Each year brings new opportunities and new participants to the South Shore Work Activity Program, or SSWAP as it is commonly known. We work with participants in-house and through work placements to assist them in building and practicing skills so they are ready to explore work options, gain, and maintain employment. We continue to adapt our programming to best meet the needs of participants and potential employers in our community, through strategic planning (above).

This year, 50 participants from Lunenburg and Queens counties engaged in our diverse and supportive program, focusing on employability skills like teamwork, motivation, accountability, presentation, adaptability, stress management, problem solving, as well as personal success skills, computer skills and workplace essential skills.

Participants are provided with a program that exposes them to a variety of work areas in customer service, food services, woodworking, and environmental/janitorial services, followed by a work placement with one of our 25 work placement host partners.

South Shore Work Activity Program receives funding from the Government of Canada and the Province of Nova Scotia, under the direction of the Department of Community Services.



Tammy's Dream

Tammy had tried our program before. This time she came with unwavering determination to complete it. It was her dream. She even wrote a poem about it. Throughout the program, Tammy gained more confidence in her abilities and skills. She recognized the value of applying these abilities through her work placements. With exemplary resolve she worked through the program, completing it in March 2019. To top it all off, Tammy was hired by her work placement host employer in her home community. Way to go Tammy!

When Josh started the SSWAP program he did not have any work experience and was not sure what he wanted to do for work. He had an excellent work ethic, which he demonstrated in each of the work exposure areas. He explored work possibilities that matched his interests and built confidence in his skills as an employee through work placements. Josh was pleased to be hired by one of his work placement hosts and has been working steadily since leaving the program.
