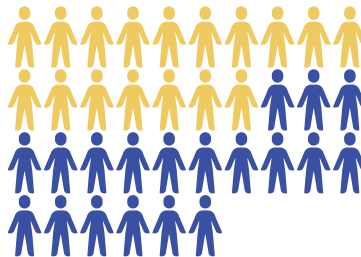

YEAR IN REVIEW LEARN. GROW. SUCCEED.

During the year our focus was on participants' and staff health and wellbeing. Most days involved an outdoor exercise and a craft or activity. Some highlights were courtyard bingo and karaoke, tie dying, bottle rockets, bike rides, and the gardening & craft kits you helped provide. It was a happy day when we could host outdoor family visits!

We said good-bye as two participants moved to long-term care. We welcomed two new participants and several new staff. We welcomed participants back to work, and then had to close our vocational program again. Many participants used the extra time at home to achieve personal goals - cooking, walking, scrapbooking, biking, sewing and more.

Lots of maintenance was also completed over the past year, including - doors painted, new fire alarm system installed, residence windows replaced, expanded parking area at residence, as well as some furniture upgrades in participant living spaces.

Generosity, Family & Caring

As she would tell it, on their first date Jim invited Myrt to a hockey game. She wore a little lace dress under her coat and nearly froze to death. She had never been to a hockey game before.

Shortly after, when Jim graduated from Saint Mary's College (SMU) in 1946, as a star hockey goalie, he was drafted by the Bruins to attend training camp in Boston.

He only stayed for a year. He and Myrt had just met before he left. "She said he always told her he came back because of her," shares daughter Susan.

They were married in 1949 and went on to have four children and ten grandchildren, and be active members of their community.

With a background in business, Jim first became involved with Bonny Lea Farm "many years ago" when someone approached him about serving on the Board.

Jim and Myrt were instantly hooked when they saw the work Bonny Lea Farm was doing and the impact it had on participants' lives. Bonny Lea Farm quickly became one of their favourite causes.

Over the years they believed strongly in doing what they could to offer others the opportunity to reach their potential and giving a chance to those who weren't blessed with the advantages they had.

In Myrt's words, they enjoyed giving back.

In time, each of their ten grandchildren suffered the sudden and devastating loss of a parent. In every case, Myrt was there as a quiet and strong support to give them a place of comfort and a person that was a constant in their lives.

As the grandchildren moved away for studies and to pursue careers, they continued to keep in touch with Myrt through phone calls and visits and more recently, video chats. She was their anchor, a sounding board, the baker of delicious treats and always full of good humour. She relished in their stories and achievements.

When Jim developed Parkinsons, Myrt cared for him at home. More recently, when Myrt discovered that her lymphoma was terminal, she wished to remain at home. A wish her family fulfilled.

Myrt was also very passionate about making a gift to Bonny Lea Farm. She and Susan were pleased to learn how easy it is to make a gift of shares.

After meeting with Bonny Lea Farm, Myrt chose for a portion of her gift to help us meet our goal, enabling the installation of automatic generators for seven of our homes, with the remainder to be used to help build our Aging in Place home.

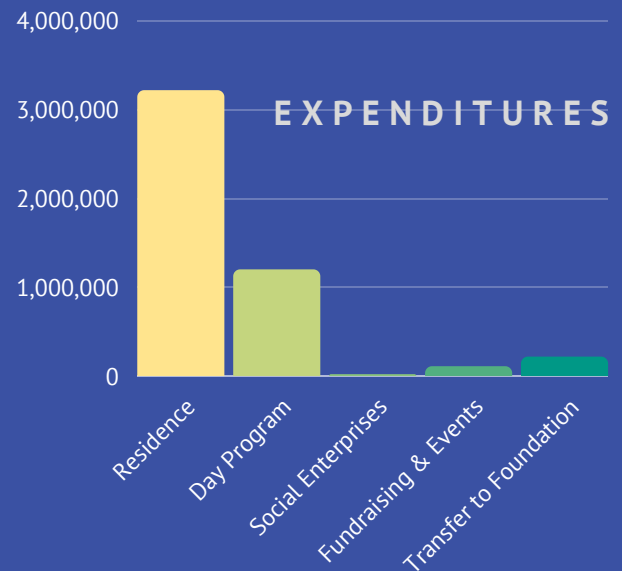
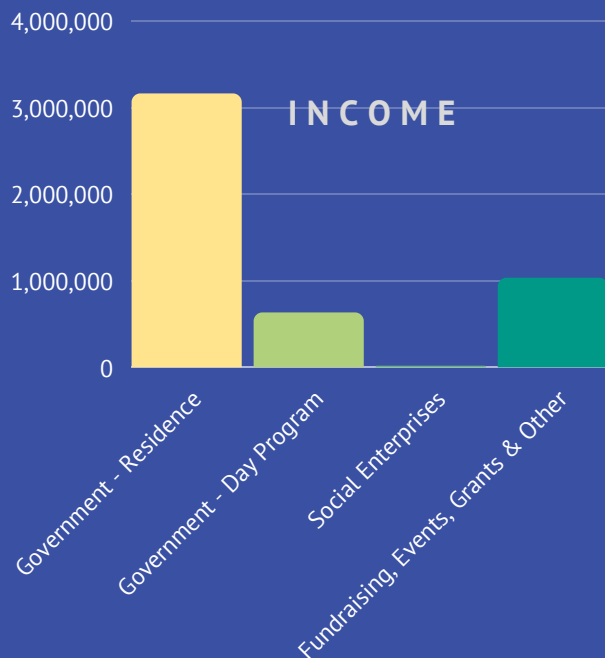

We couldn't do it without you!

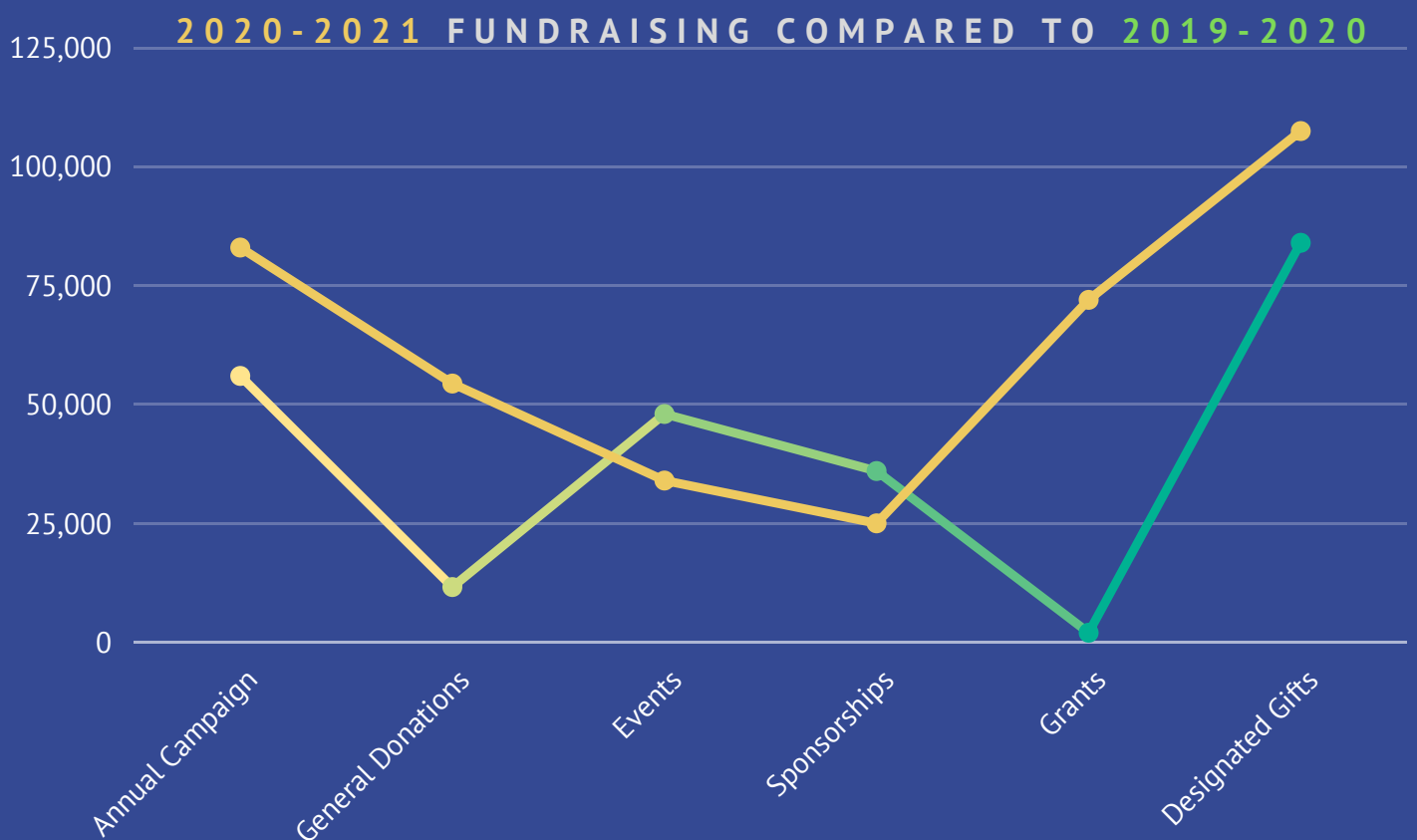
We value all of you who have been there for us. We are so very grateful to you, our community, for recognizing the work that is unseen, behind the scenes, at Bonny Lea Farm.

SOUTH SHORE WORK ACTIVITY PROGRAM

The South Shore Work Activity Program proudly works with people to break down their barriers to finding and maintaining employment, by helping them develop skills and abilities that will move them toward successfully meeting their goals.

People may apply to the program directly or be referred by the Department of Community Services or other organizations.

Our program marked a lot of firsts this year. All of the restrictions and requirements of the pandemic coupled with adapting to our new 9-week format with continuous intake were deftly handled by our team.

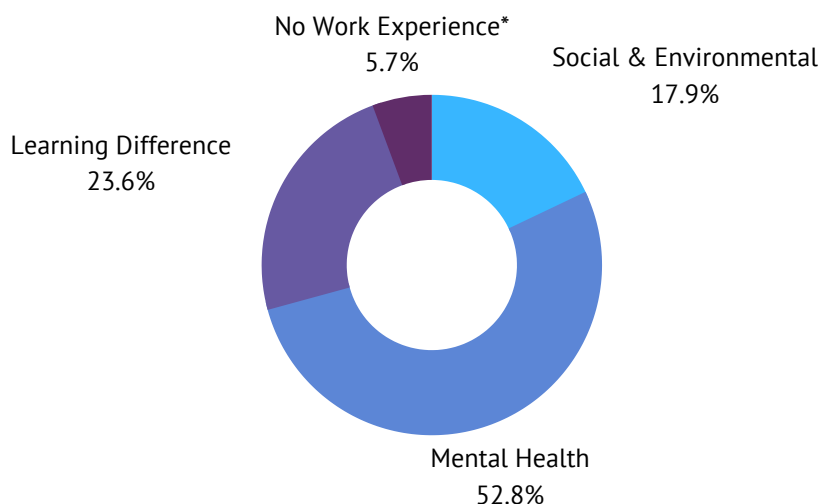
We supported 36 program participants both in person and virtually, including our first ever virtual Food Services cooking classes via Zoom. We celebrated 11 participants moving into the labour market with employer partners all along the South Shore.

Other participant accomplishments included successful certifications and attendance improvements.

To celebrate it all we made history by having the first SSWAP Recognition on Wheels by meeting participants at outdoor venues in their home communities, as shown above with Ethan.

Discovering Abilities

Ethan began the program unsure of what he wanted to do for employment. He said stress management and low confidence were holding him back, and he was struggling to find motivation.

Once here, Ethan eagerly participated in all the different work areas offered at SSWAP and stepped out of his comfort zone to try new things. As he learned new skills you could really see his confidence growing.

His stress also seemed to decrease as his confidence increased. As part of the program, Ethan did a placement at Sobeys in Liverpool. It was a good experience and he accepted employment from them afterwards.

At follow up Ethan was happy to report that he was still at Sobeys, getting lots of shifts and saving to buy a car.
